Red Line Extension

- 5.6-mile extension
- Four new stations:
 - 103rd Street (near Eggleston)
 - 111th Street (near Eggleston)
 - Michigan Avenue (near 116th Street)
 - 130th Street (at Altgeld Gardens)
- Multimodal connections at each station including bus, bike, pedestrian, and park & ride facilities




Graphic of CTA's existing rail network along with four new proposed stations










