SECRETARY GREENLEE: Chairman Barclay, there are no public comments for this month.

CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Our next item of business on the agenda is our president report which is -- which will be given by President Dorval Carter.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. PRESIDENT CARTER: Members of the Board, I'm pleased to provide you with an update regarding the ongoing progress that we are making relative to our Meeting the Moment I'm excited to share some of our most Action Plan. recent accomplishments and some of the more promising trends that we've identified which I believe reflect improvement across many of our key performance indicators. As you know, we are watching our services and programs closely to determine the effectiveness of the changes we're making and the impact that our proactive management initiatives are having. For a closer examination I'd like to begin by taking a look at our Meeting the Moment scorecard. Our service optimization continues to show progress in the right direction with lower double and triple headways on rail.



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service delivery is close to 95 percent and big gaps of buses are slightly higher at 6.6 percent than March and continue to trend significantly lower than pre-optimization which is around 12 percent. The gaps that I referenced a moment ago are somewhat seasonally driven primarily by increased construction and more special events that we are now supporting. The latter of which requires us to sort of reallocate our bus operators to support the events around our regular service. Notably, our latest rail service figures continue to show improved alignment between available workforce and schedule which results in rail service delivery reaching almost 90 percent of Improved rail service delivery scheduled in April. is a direct result of new operators starting in April on the Red, Blue and other lines. example, Red Line service delivery improved from 76 percent in March to 91 percent in April.

In April, we also graduated a class of eighteen new rail operators and they're already making an impact on our rail service. We have another two classes of rail operators each with nineteen new operators currently in training. And



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the first class of those remaining will graduate during the week of June 3rd with a second completing their training in late July. I look forward to obviously adding these additional rail operators this summer to help us maintain the momentum that we're seeing. As we improve service, we're also continuing our great work that's being done as part of our ongoing refresh and renew station improvement program which is a key part of our action plan that contributes greatly to making our rail stations cleaner and safer and is an important part in creating a better overall CTA travel experience for our customers. In 2023, CTA committed to repairing and revitalizing twenty-nine stations under our refresh and renew. Three of which have already been completed. That includes the Addison on the Red Line, 35th on the Red Line and 35th on the Green Line. Those efforts are being complimented by our seasonal power washing teams which is a separate group of personnel that are dispatched during the overnight hours and are tasked with scrubbing and power washing the service of CTA stations. And you can see some pictures of the power washing teams on your monitors.



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year we've also expanded our refresh and renew program to include eighteen additional facilities for upgrades, twelve bus turnarounds and six other employee facilities. Our crews have already begun upgrading eight of them. And I want to highlight that because this is the direct response to our employees. They have told us that they wanted to see updates to bathrooms and turnaround locations and that's exactly what we are focusing on in our refresh and renew program because we do want to basically ensure that we are meeting and addressing their comfort and safety issues as they are concerns to us. As we discussed earlier during the board meeting, these are part of the many things that we're trying to do to improve the conditions that our employees work in and to obviously show that we care about our employees and we want to show them that through the facilities that they operate in. Our VP for capital construction, Steve Mascheri is going to show you a few of the before and after photos of the refresh and renew work that we've been working on a little bit later but we will continue to look for other ways to invest in our employees, as indicated earlier, with these



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kinds of improvements as well as other programs that we believe will benefit our employees over the long run.

As I've indicated, the retention of our employees is just as critical as the hiring of new employees and we're focusing on both of these at the same time. As you are aware, we're also working very hard to recruit, train and onboard employees at a rate rarely if ever seen by most public transit agencies. I'm not going to repeat a lot of the stuff that Tom McKone went through but I think you got a very good understanding of what we're doing and where things stand today. reemphasize the fact that we have another career fair that's coming up May 19th and once again to our board of directors and anyone else who is watching these proceedings, please, spread the word. CTA is hiring for jobs with both good pay and good benefits. We also know our strategy can and will work. In fact, later this afternoon we will be celebrating over ninety new successful trainees at a graduation ceremony here in our headquarters building. Our progress is reflected in the numbers and we have more bus operators and



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service today than we did one year ago and we are continuing to see our overall workforce numbers increase. As I've discussed with you earlier, our eyes remain firmly focused on the ball in terms of increasing our workforce both in terms of new hires and better attrition. And it is my hope and expectation that this trend will portend for good -- good -- many good things in the future.

Of course one of the reasons why we're seeking to hire many more employees is because we are also continuing to see a return of our customers post-pandemic. As we continue to see positive progress with hiring and service reliability each month, we are also seeing positive growth in our ridership. For example, last Wednesday we had our highest bus ridership day since the beginning of the pandemic with 554,000 rides. 13,000 more rides than the highest day last we also had our second highest week-long bus fall. ridership totals of the pandemic last week with 3.182 million rides which is the highest week coming just three weeks prior at 3.2 million rides. Both of these weeks have beat the highest weeks that we saw from last fall. During most years the



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fall season is when we tend to have our highest ridership days. So the fact that we are seeing this level of ridership during the spring is certainly a very good sign that our ridership is starting to come back. In March, CTA's combined bus and rail system ridership was up 12 percent versus last year and preliminary numbers which I will share next month point to April being even better. CTA also reached a new high point in March with current bus ridership reaching 64 percent of pre-pandemic 2019 ridership. We tend to refer to this number as our ridership retention number and we are very happy to see progress in this metric as Additionally, downtown ridership is showing well. strong growth and as more people return to the office and other activities downtown stations on the Loop elevated are up 17 percent versus last year and bus routes that serve only the Loop area are up 46 percent during the same period. We are also seeing some promising ridership growth on the Blue Line due in part to the Kennedy construction project which is allowing us to show car commuters a most -- both faster and more affordable way to get downtown. On the O'Hare branch, rail ridership



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is now up approximately 1500 rides per day in the morning rush alone since the Kennedy construction and train frequency improvements began. While some of its ridership is due to seasonality in that we normally see increased ridership in the spring time, the normal rides of ridership when the weather warms up they are strong indications that the corollary between the increased CTA ridership and only time will tell us if this trend continues to a multi-year reconstruction project. But our initial data tends to suggest that this is not just seasonal increases but people making decisions to ride CTA in lieu of fighting the traffic on the Kennedy right now.

I would also like to share with you that we are in the process of completing our review and analysis and results of our customer survey for the first quarter of the year which includes feedback from both frequent and infrequent riders. While we will provide you with a more fulsome and comprehensive review of what we've learned next month, I can tell you now that we know that things are moving in the right direction. While there are and will always be areas where we need to and can



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improve, there are also many areas where we can plainly see that our system optimization efforts and other initiatives are starting to have an impact. I also said our post-pandemic return, and I need to keep reminding everybody of this, is more akin to a marathon than a sprint. So I'm sharing these details with you now because I think they are encouraging for CTA and demonstrates that little by little we are seeing improvements in key service areas and we're moving the agency in the right direction. As I have been in the past months, I will continue to update you on the progress that we're making on these various data points. also looking forward to sharing with you some new performance metrics that we have been working on and more -- and more transparency around the data that we share with the public about our service, what's going on with our service and how we ultimately are addressing our service over a period of time. That -- that preview will also happen in the next month or so. Mr. Chairman, that completes my remarks regarding our action plan and other activities that we're engaged in and I'm happy to answer any questions that the Board may have.



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Thank you, President Carter, CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: for the update. First of all, I'd like to say we were very pleased to see the significant progress we are making in our hiring efforts which we discussed earlier this morning. I attended the new hire graduation last month and saw firsthand the enthusiasm and pride of the new hires joining the CTA family. Their excitement is reflective of the thought and effort the team has put in to making CTA the company of choice to build a career through the recruitment and application process, through training, graduation and eventually serving our Hiring and retention are key components customers. to addressing service and reliability issues. And I applaud the efforts you make and look forward to the continued progress. Regarding the service reliability and overall customer service while there are complex factors and contributing issues in these areas, as I mentioned in briefings, there are some ways that we could show our public the steps we're taking in the short term to address Messaging is one of those methods. these issues. I'm pleased to see that the team is taking the feedback from the school about proactively getting



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the message out about our efforts and the progress we're making along the way. I look forward to the team sharing updates of this effort.

Lastly, I'd like to thank all who applied for the Citizens Advisory Board. As you know, that's near and dear to me. The application process closed on April 28th and we received over 130 applications. I'm encouraged by the demonstration of our customers' engagement and interest. Applications are currently being reviewed and we will have updates in the coming weeks. So, please, stay tuned for that. At this point I'd like to open up to the rest of the Board members for any comments in response to President Carter's remarks.

DIRECTOR JAKES: Well, President Carter, I want to say that you are being quite modest as although you talked about the employees and what they needed. I know you're also responding to the public when they said the same thing. So, you know -- so you were being modest but, you know, I want the public to know you heard them and -- and you made a team of responders. So thank you.

PRESIDENT CARTER: Yeah. You know, I -- I



thank you for that comment and I think it is
important that I'm clear about the fact that by no
stretch of the imagination are we where we want to
be. We still have challenges.

DIRECTOR JAKES: Right.

PRESIDENT CARTER: Our service isn't at -- you know, at the level that we want it to be to get to the level -- (inaudible) -- working hard to improve the situation and we have a strategy that I think is indicated by all the feedback that we're seeing that's working that's going to get us back to where we want to be in the long term.

CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Our next order of business 10 11 is a construction report from Grace Ohs, our Vice 12 President For Purple -- Red-Purple Modernization. 13 Steve Mascheri. 14 SECRETARY GREENLEE: Mascheri(different 15 pronunciation). 16 Mascheri. Vice President of CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: 17 Capital Construction, and JuanPablo Prieto, our 18 Director of Diversity Programs. Good morning, Chairman and Board 19 MR. MASCHERI: 20 of Directors. My name is Steve Mascheri. I'm your 21 Vice President of Capital Construction for the core 22 Today we'll be going through the program. 23 presentation of the core projects at then which



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point I will turn it over to Grace Ohs to talk

about RPM. Next slide. The first project we'll be talking about is the CDOT Lake Line Damen Station which we've been excited to talk about the progression of the work both within the -- the structural foundation improvements as well as the work coming out of the ground and seeing the -- the station start to come to shape.

Next slide. This photograph here shows the contractor pouring the foundation pier caps and a couple of the bents which is going to be a series of structural improvements that will have these new structural members supporting the track structure that is currently ongoing. Next slide. This photograph here is showing the station starting to come out of the ground and is actually showing the elevator tower being constructed right now with a series of rebar cages that are tied together and then placed inside of a formwork. Once that formwork is completed, they'll pour concrete inside the formwork which will be the structural member of the elevator tower itself.

Next slide. This photograph is showing the formwork of that elevator tower being built from the exterior. So this work is progressing



quite well. Next slide. The next project we'll be talking about is the non-revenue vehicle facility at 63rd Street. We have a lot of work happening throughout the site both inside the facility, outside the facility and also various site work. Next slide. Here we are showing the contractors installing roof drains that will ensure weather tightness inside the facility once staff move inside which we're expecting to have at the end of the year. Next slide. Here we're showing the contractor is doing excavation for wash pits as well as inspection pits which will be used to do maintenance and inspection work for the vehicle facilities once the facility is ready for personnel use at the end of the year.

Next slide. This is showing the contractor pouring concrete duct banks for utility work which will be providing electrical, power and communications at various aspects of the interior of the facility. Next slide. The next project we'll talk -- be talking about is the traction power upgrades at Barry, Damen and Canal substations. A lot of the work has been focusing on the Damen substation as well as the Belmont



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crossover which was approved two months ago with the Board. So we're seeing work progressing well and on several fronts here. Next slide. we're showing the existing track that's being -- was build in the 1950s is being removed. And we've showed previous months just the kind of -- the level of effort that it takes to remove some of that existing track work inside the subway under a series of weekend line cuts. We've been progressing well with that work. We're expecting to have that done later this spring. Next slide. And this photo is showing the contractor bringing in the new -- the new track which we've -- we've preassembled into panels which are then brought or put into place on the left and then on the right we're seeing how the new panels are then tied into the existing track work so it's one smooth track structure for the trains to move as they move through after the end of the weekend. So we've been really happy with how that work has been progressing.

Next slide. These photos are showing the Damen substation. You know, the work is now coming -- you know, is out of the ground and now



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we're starting to bolt everything -- the structure together. And we're also putting together the enclosure. As you can see on the photo on the left, we actually have the roof structure going on. So we -- work is progressing very well while the equipment is also being fabricated so this -- we're very happy with the progress on this job site as well. Next slide. This is outside the construction area. This is the refresh and renew program that President Carter talked about. This is the -- the start of this year's cycle which were excited to report on. This year we currently are planning to address twenty-nine stations. Three of them have already been completed which is Addison Red Line as well as Sox 35th and 35th, IIT on the Green Line. So we have the whole list of work that we're planning of stations to -- to attack which will be customer facing. As well as, as President Carter talked about, employee facing where it's important for us to be able to provide investments to what we consider internal customers at bus turnarounds as well as facilities.

Next slide. I'm just going to show you a few photos of before and afters. So this Addison



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Red Line outside of Wrigley Field where we've done some repair and painting of the store front panels at the platform level. Next slide. And on Sox 35th we have -- we were paint -- we've done some minor repairs and painting of the staircases and handrail repairs as well. Various signage repairs and replacements as well as checking to ensure that the lighting is in good order as well. Next slide. This is a photo of the painting of the staircases before on the left, after on the right. You can see the improvements there. Next slide. This is some painting and some repairs that we've done at 35th on the Green Line. We've painted all the staircases as well as various elements on the platform level.

Next slide. This is showing a handful of items that we've done not just with the cosmetic improvements but also done some preventative maintenance for the Rotogates, signage, lighting. We kind of tried to do a tip to tail on these refresh and renew initiatives. Next slide. In addition to doing the stations, we're also starting to do some of the bus turnarounds. This is the bus turnaround at 79th and South Shore where you can



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see we've done some painting of the bollards. 1 We've done some minor concrete replacement. We've 2 done some polishing of the stainless steel on the 3 4 exterior of the facility. Next slide. And we've also done some work on the interior. So we've done 5 a repair and a recoating of the bathroom facility. 6 We've cleaned up some -- a couple of leaks. 7 8 made sure that all the heating and lighting 9 elements are working in proper order so that 10 they're -- they're safe and appropriate to use when 11 they're -- when they're needed by the employees. 12 Next slide. I will turn it over to Grace Ohs. 13 MS. OHS: Thank you, Steve. Good afternoon, 14 Chairman Barclay and Directors. My name is Grace 15 Ohs and I'm the Vice President of Construction on 16 the RPM Project. Next slide. Thank you. The 17 project continues forward as we prepare for stage 18 changes. Most notably in the quarter signal improvement portions we are working -- continuing 19 20 our work at Winona relay house. We have completed 21 wiring and are started pretesting of the signal 22 equipment that was in -- arrived on site last 23 month. In the Lawrence to Bryn Mawr portion of the 24 project, we are continuing with track work as we



move forward to our stage change later this summer. we're also making progress in the temporary In the Red-Purple bypass stations in that area. area the contractor is completing deck pours and getting ready to begin track work installation. We are moving towards a stage change at the end of this summer for that portion. Next slide. This photo in the Red-Purple bypass area shows some of the work I just mentioned. Here we have the final deck pour. This is the base on which the track work will be installed. We'll later see them come back and pour plinths, install plates and rail and third rail as we get ready to operate trains on this portion of the work. Next slide. Additionally, we're continuing our progress at the Clark relay house. Last month we showed you ComEd's work. This month we're highlighting the HVAC installation for the new relay house and that work is continuing.

Next slide. In the Lawrence to Bryn Mawr area we have two temp stations. We are getting ready to serve customers in the next phase of the project. Here we highlight the roof truss work being completed at the Bryn Mawr temp station.



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Next slide. And here we see work further along at the Argyle temp station. We've completed the framing and we're starting on the electrical work. we also see that stairway leading up to track level and in the next slide we can see the platform taking shape. So this temporary platform and platform canopy will serve customers in the next stage of the project. Next slide. Track work is continuing and nearing completion. Here we see the traction power work taking place. We see the third rail blocks which the chairs will sit on and then the contact rail or third rail will sit on top of those chairs. We also see the auxiliary negative return system which will be covered by a future foot walk there in the center. So we'll have a center foot walk in between these two new tracks.

Next slide. So I wanted to share recognition that the project received. CTA received recognition for the RPM phase one project. On May 4th, the project received the Innovative Transportation Solution Award from the Women's Transportation Seminar, WTS, the Chicagoland chapter. This annual award is quite an honor and it really highlights this transformative project.



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women make up 50 percent of the RPM project team and we have women leading construction, engineering and public affairs. Next slide. Additionally, outreach is continuing. We have had weekly meetings with the 44th and the 48th ward aldermanic offices. We've also done -- met with several of the chambers to discuss the open for business campaign and provide them with updates on what that campaign can offer. We've met with two neighborhood groups, the Sheridan Park neighbors and Buena Vista Condo Association, and host O and As with constituents. I'll also note here on April 13th we did have kind of a wall smashing, groundbreaking on the announcement of RPM removing the embankment walls. We see President Carter taking a swing at that century old embankment that we're going to be able to fully remove now under this plan. That concludes my update and I'll hand things over to JuanPablo for workforce diversity. Thanks, Grace. Good morning, MR. PRIETO:

MR. PRIETO: Thanks, Grace. Good morning,
Directors. JuanPablo Prieto, Director of Diversity
Programs. We continue to meet with the contractor
monthly to discuss DBE and workforce outreach and
compliance. We're still sending out opportunities



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for DBEs when they -- when the prime has them so that they're aware of the trade packages and -- and how to submit them. Open career opportunities with both prime and their subs are sent to both of our workforce partners, the Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership and Hire360, so they can refer interested and qualified candidates to meet our workforce goals. On April 27th, we hosted another session of our tracks to trades program which was developed through RPM to bring -- to expose CPS students to careers in the construction industry. Speakers included: Charles Freeman, General Manager of Capital Construction at CTA; and representatives from Chicago Public Schools Construction, Architecture, Manufacturing, Pre-Engineering, Transportation or CAMPT team; Walsh-Fluor; II in One Contractors, a DBE firm on RPM; Atlantic Painting, another DBE firm on RPM; Job Corps; Revolution Workshop; Richard Daley College; and Trinal, Inc., which is Walsh-Fluor's workforce consultant on RPM, also a DBE firm. spoke to a group of juniors and a group of seniors at Simeon Career Academy High School in two sessions. One in the morning and one in afternoon.



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Speakers spoke about their path in the -- in the construction industry and how students could find a path for themselves. Job Corps, Revolution Workshop and Daley College spoke about the educational opportunities and resources that they provide to prepare career seekers. We had several students network with the speakers after the presentation and hoped to have sparked the interest of some of the students as they think about their I'm proud to say that our DBE awards future. continue to grow. As of April 30th, DBEs have been awarded over 239 million dollars between the design and construction packages on RPM phase one. dollars have been awarded to 89 unique DBE firms. 34 of which are new to CTA. On the workforce side as of April -- as of the end of April, 1,821 unique individuals have worked over 1.2 million labors hours and earned over 70 million dollars. Those numbers include 393 residents of economically disadvantaged areas that have worked over 353.000 labors hours and earned over 19.8 million dollars. That concludes my portion of the report. And now I'd like to show you the next installment in our monthly video series in which we highlighted the



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RPM phase one project's ambitious workforce and DBE 1 2 inclusion programs by featuring workers as well as 3 DBEs participating in the project. Today you'll hear from Marion Bolden, an electrician apprentice 4 with Meade, one of the subcontractors building the 5 RPM project. It is truly an honor to share these 6 7 stories of Chicagoans in their own words on how CTA 8 and RPM have improved their lives. Thank you. 9 (Video played.)

MR. PRIETO: Thank you. We'd be happy to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you. I appreciate that, JuanPablo. Any questions for JuanPablo or comments?

DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Yeah.

DIRECTOR MILLER: No. Go ahead.

DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Yeah. No. I continue to be thankful for all of the efforts that are done to support DBE including minority entities as well as women entities. I also really wanted to highlight that appreciate -- appreciated the numbers for women in -- in the project as well. I think it is an important movement and system change work that we're doing overall. I think we see the changes



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immediately but I think also long term all of these steps make a huge difference. And so I want to continue to thank you and advocate for more of this effort because I think it's really important. And then also the other piece that I wanted to highlight is both thinking about construction and professional services. We all know that on the early side of the work there are a lot of positive impacts that we can do. So I continue to be really thankful for those aspects as well and throughout the process to be thinking about opportunities to enhance our works through participation and inclusion of a variety of different partners. Thank you.

PRESIDENT CARTER: I know, Director Ortiz, you mentioned the -- the number around the work -- the women in the workforce and I think I -- I would be remiss if I didn't point out that Grace Ohs is a newly promoted head of the RPM project. And is obviously one of the stars in our organization. And so you may not have had a chance to meet her or see her before because usually Bill Mooney does these reports but she is the person behind the scene that's really driving that project now. And



1 I'm very proud to have her as part of my team and 2 have her working on this project.

DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Thank you.

DIRECTOR MILLER: I want to say to JuanPablo thanks a lot and we see the continuous progress that you all are making through the community and in the RPM projects. But all you're doing with the DBEs is you're certainly going up and we congratulate you and the team.

MR. PRIETO: Thank you, sir.

CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Any further comments? Thank you. To all of you thank you very much. We appreciate you.

MR. PRIETO: Thank you.

MS. OHS: Thank you.

PRESIDENT CARTER: Mr. Chairman, before you move on, I do have one -- one other update that I want to give you on a construction report that I think the Board will be happy to hear about.

Obviously we -- we -- we focus on our -- our construction report on both RPM and the other construction projects that are going on but I'd also like to give you an update on the Red Line extension. As you know, that project continues to



1 move forward and we have put out on the street 2 recently our RFQ for the design construction of 3 that contract. I'm pleased to announce that we 4 have identified the finalists for the RFO process. This will be the public announcement of that group. 5 And I'm very pleased to let you know that we have 6 three entities that are in the running to do this 7 8 The first with one FH Paschen, Ragnar work. 9 Benson. Milhouse and Bowa. The second one is 10 Kiewit Infrastructure Company and the third one is 11 Walsh, NC Construction, Transit Community Partners. 12 So not only -- when we -- when start these 13 solicitations, we never have a real good sense of 14 who's ultimately going to be interested in doing the work for us and one of the things that we have 15 16 strived for in the past is to get some sort of 17 combination of both local and national. international recognition for this work. And I'm 18 19 pleased to say that we have a mix here of both 20 local and international and of course with Milhouse 21 you have a minority-owned firm that's in the mix 22 So really good group. A really good 23 combination. And -- and they will now move into 24 the next phase of the procurement process where



will begin negotiations with these three firms to determine which one will be identified as the firm to do the project itself.

CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you very much for that update and also congratulations on the 200 million dollar award.

PRESIDENT CARTER: Yes.

CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: You know, for -- you might just want to put in a --

PRESIDENT CARTER: Well, and we -- we -- we were informed -- earlier this week we were informed that we won a discretionary grant from the Federal Transit Administration for 200 million dollars for the purchase of rail cars. I think the interesting thing was that the entire grant program was only 700 million and we got 200 million of it. So a pretty nice chunk of money that's coming to CTA that will obviously fund our ongoing efforts to replace our aging railcar fleet and to obviously improve both the quality and reliability of the rail service that we're providing to our customers.

CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you to you and your team for that effort. Our final order of business is new business. Georgette, is there any news
