2	MS. GREENLEE: Good morning. My name is
3	Georgette Greenlee. I'm secretary of the Chicago
4	Transit Authority Transit Board. Today is October
5	13th, 2023. And we are going to begin our
6	committee meeting for finance, audit, and budget.
7	Director Jakes.
8	DIRECTOR JAKES: Good morning. I would
9	like to call to order the October 13th, 2023,
10	meeting of the committee on finance, audit, and
11	budget.
12	Georgette, would you please call the roll.
13	MS. GREENLEE: Director Miller.
14	DIRECTOR MILLER: Here.
15	MS. GREENLEE: Chairman Barclay.
16	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Yes. Here.
17	MS. GREENLEE: Director Jakes.
18	DIRECTOR JAKES. Yes. Here.

1	DIRECTOR JAKES: Our first order of
2	business is the approval of the committee minutes
3	of September 22nd, 2023. May I have a motion to
4	approve?
5	DIRECTOR MILLER: So moved.
6	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Second.
7	MS. GREENLEE: It's been moved by Director
8	Miller and seconded by Director Ortiz. We'll take
9	a roll call vote.
10	Director Jha.
11	DIRECTOR JHA: Yes.
12	MS. GREENLEE: Director Ortiz.

21	minutes from September 22, 2023, passes.
22	DIRECTOR JAKES: Our next order of
23	business is the financial report.
24	Jeremy Fine.

1	MR. FINE: Good morning.
2	DIRECTOR JAKES: Good morning.
3	MR. FINE: I'm Jeremy Fine, your chief
4	financial officer, and I'll be reporting on the
5	August results.
6	You can now that I have my technical
7	skills in line, we'll get to the report. So the
8	August revenues are following a similar-type form
9	of what we've seen in prior months through the
10	beginning half of 2023.
11	We see fare and pass totals coming in at
12	about \$1.9 million, better than expected. We see
13	reduced fare subsidy coming in as expected. And
14	we see non-farebox totals coming in a little bit
15	below expectations by about \$500,000. But,
16	overall, for the month of August, we see a
17	positive budget variance of \$1.4 million. And we
18	see about \$2.6 million better than August of 2022.
19	With regard to year-to-date revenues, we
20	see a similar-type pattern here where we're
21	positive on fare and pass totals by \$10.2 million.
22	Reduced fare subsidy coming in as expected.
23	Non-farebox totals coming in better than expected
24	by \$3.6 million on a year-to-date basis.

1	So, overall, through August, we see a
2	total aggregate positive budget variance of 13.8
3	versus revenues.
4	And with regard to our expenses, we see
5	August expenses coming in better than expected for
6	labor by about \$5 million; \$4.8 million for the
7	month. Again, this this has come down a little
8	bit from the beginning of the year as our hiring
9	efforts have continued to ramp up.
10	Materials coming in essentially flat but
11	slightly positive. Fuel coming in positive by
12	\$1.2 million, power by almost \$400,000. Injuries
13	and damages coming in as expected. And then
14	security services is negative by about \$2.5
15	million, again, as we've ramped up our security
16	efforts throughout the system.
17	Other expenses coming in, \$4.4 million to
18	the positive. So, overall, for the month of
19	August, we see a positive variance of \$8.3
20	million. And when you couple that with our
21	positive favorability on revenues, we're \$9.8
22	million better than budgeted expectations for the
23	month of August.
24	With regard to year-to-date expenses, we

see, again, positive favorability on labor. 1 2 Essentially flat but slightly down on materials. 3 Fuel and power have been good performers for us 4 throughout the year. Injuries, damages coming in 5 as expected. And security services coming in 6 below expectations by -- or negative to 7 expectations by \$8.6 million, again, because of 8 the ramped-up security efforts throughout the 9 system. Other expenses coming in, \$19.6 million favorable. 10 11 And, overall, year-to-date with regard to 12 our expenses, we're a little over \$75 million to 13 the positive versus our budgeted expectations. When you factor in our revenues, we're about 14 15 \$89.2 million to the positive on a year-to-date 16 basis. 17 With regard to our public funding for the month, we see a positive variance here for sales 18 tax and for PTF, the public transportation funds. 19 20 We see negative variance for RETT, the real estate 2.1 transfer tax, and PTF on RETT. And, again, this 22 follows form of what we've seen in prior months. 23 As interest rates continue to go up, we've seen 24 that having a long shadow over housing and

commercial sales, which depresses the amount of RETT that we receive on a monthly basis.

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With regard to year-to-date public funding, again, we see positive variance on sales tax and PTF, a negative variance on real estate transfer tax and PTF on real estate transfer tax, but, overall, we're essentially flat for the year, slightly positive by \$1.5 million.

With regard to our Federal relief funding draws, we are drawing about \$50 million for the month. That is slightly higher than what we've seen in prior months, and that was because we preemptively drew a little bit more in case there was a Federal shutdown so that we could have enough funding to cover whatever period of shutdown that may have occurred. Thankfully, that did not happen, and so we'll utilize these extra draws in the coming month or two to offset draws that we would otherwise have to do in those months.

We draw in to date now about 52.5 percent of the total allocation, but we still have about 1 billion, you know, remaining. So, again, we expect this funding to last us, you know, plus or

1	minus till the end of 2025.
2	With regard to the three commodities that
3	we purchased, fuel, power, and natural gas, we're
4	where we need to be locked in for the foreseeable
5	future on all three commodities.
6	Fuel, because of the strategic method that
7	we went about purchasing fuel when it was at lows,
8	we're locked in for where we need to be through
9	2025, which is very advantageous now as you're
10	seeing. Because of all of the problems in the
11	Middle East, fuel prices are starting to spike up
12	again. So we're locked in for the foreseeable
13	future on that commodity.
14	We continue to look for opportunities to
15	buy on the other two commodities, but, again, this
16	strategy has worked out very well for us on being
17	able to lock in that favorable pricing.
18	I'm glad to answer any questions that you
19	may have on August or year-to-date results.
20	DIRECTOR JAKES: Thank you, Jeremy.
21	You said you drew down 50 million in case
22	of Federal shutdown.
23	MR. FINE: Correct.
24	DIRECTOR JAKES: We know that that's

1 temporary. So if there's another threat of a 2 Federal shutdown, will there be another set of draws to happen or are you going to lean on the 50 3 4 million that you already drew down? 5 MR. FINE: So the plan -- great question. 6 The plan is that we'll use the draws that we've 7 done to date for, you know, the September draw 8 that we would need to do. And, you know, that may 9 last us into October, potentially, if -- depending 10 on what the monthly draw would be for September. We'll continue to monitor the situation. 11 12 And we will do additional draws if we need to if it does look like there's going to be, you know, 13 14 some type of shutdown at the Federal Government 15 level. 16 We have had a very long strategy of just 17 drawing down what we need in the months -- months 18 that we need it. We continue to plan to do it that way. That was the guidance that we received 19 20 early on from the FTA. And, again, that strategy 2.1 has worked out very well for us and we'll continue 22 to do it as such. But we will continue to monitor the situation. 2.3 2.4 Because, if, again, we want -- we want to

1	make sure that we're fully protected if there is
2	any type of short-term, you know, shutdown in the
3	Federal Government and that we have the money
4	available for those, you know, allowable costs to
5	offset those, you know, on a monthly basis.
6	DIRECTOR JAKES: And if it's not a
7	shutdown, then the money that's been drawn will be
8	allocated somewhere else?
9	MR. FINE: The money that will be drawn
10	will be used for the same allowable expenses that
11	they're being used for not only in August but the
12	prior months. But we'll be using those for
13	allowable expenses in September and potentially
14	beyond if they were to last that long.
15	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. And with the
16	negative variance with security
17	MR. FINE: Yes.
18	DIRECTOR JAKES: with us getting ready
19	to do budget, will the adjustment be made for the
20	2024 budget based upon what we are experiencing
21	now as far as security?
22	MR. FINE: Yes. The plan is for the '24
23	budget to reflect the additional security that we
24	have laid on through 2023 that was not

1	incorporated in the '23 budget, so it would be
2	reflective of those ramped-up efforts. That would
3	be incorporated into the baseline for '24.
4	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. And I don't know
5	if this is more so for you or for President
6	Carter. So the money that's being used for
7	security, you know, will all that be laid out as
8	it relates to this is what we've got, we've done
9	this, we've gotten additional cameras, we've
10	gotten additional officers, will all that be
11	spelled out so that the public can see what's to
12	be done?
13	PRESIDENT CARTER: As part of our budget
14	book, there are discussions about every initiative
15	that CTA pursues as part of our overall strategy.
16	There is a section on security that will
17	specifically lay out exactly what we have done and
18	what we will be doing in the upcoming year with
19	regards to our security initiative, including the
20	security guards, the voluntary special employment
21	program fund that we fund for the police
22	department, as well as the additional resources
23	we'll be putting into that area.
24	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. And success

1	rate what would you say the success has been
2	with that, with increasing security?
3	PRESIDENT CARTER: Well, I think and
4	I'm actually going to talk about this in the
5	President's report.
6	Obviously, the ultimate success rate is
7	reduction in crime. I have good news on that
8	front, which I'll be speaking to in the
9	President's report. But, you know, I also like to
10	make the point and I think the police would say
11	the same thing to you is that you can't measure
12	what doesn't happen.
13	And so a big part of the effort that we
14	engage in is really a visibility campaign to make
15	sure that there are people on the system who are
16	viewed as the eyes and ears and, ultimately, along

PRESIDENT CARTER: One other point I 1 2 wanted to make with regards to the Government 3 shutdown. The Federal Transit Administration is in a 4 5 very different position this year with regards to 6 government shutdown than they have been in past 7 government shutdowns. Because, historically, the 8 funding to keep the Federal Transit Administration 9 open came out of what's referred to as the general 10 revenue fund of the congressional appropriations, 11 which meant that when Congress did not appropriate 12 money each year, the administrative expenses would 13 not be incurred. With the last three authorizations, the 14 15 administrative expenses actually were put into the 16 trust fund, which is a fund that basically exists 17 -- it's called the Highway Trust Fund, but it has a mass transit that basically funds certain 18 19 activities of the Department of Transportation. 20 And that fund remains active regardless of whether

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employees will still be able to come to work and

2 will still continued to get paid because they are being paid out of the trust fund. 3 4 What will happen, though, is that certain 5 grant-making activities may be impacted because 6 other aspects of the Government, particularly the 7 Treasury Department and others, may be shut down. 8 So Jeremy is correct in terms of making 9 sure that we're -- we're having access to and are 10 able to have the funds we need available because 11 it's not totally clear yet how the grant-accessing 12 software, the program that we use to access our funds through the Federal Government, how that 13 14 will operate under this type of scenario. 15 will be a first-time occurrence of that happening.

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So we'll obviously be monitoring it very closely. Jeremy is obviously making the right decision in terms of ensuring that we're not going to have a cash flow problem because of the government shutdown.

And you know as well as all the rest of us, none of us are able to predict what's going to happen in Congress these days, so we all kind of have to wait and see how that plays out. But we

1	will continue to do everything that we need to do
2	to make sure that it does not impact us
3	financially and that we're in a position to
4	continue to maintain the funds that we need in
5	order to continue our ongoing operations.
6	DIRECTOR JAKES: Sure. And I'm sorry,
7	Jeremy, one last question.
8	Based upon the numbers of upward mobility,
9	would you say or decline that ridership is up
10	based upon those numbers?
11	MR. FINE: Yes.
12	PRESIDENT CARTER: Jeremy can speak to
13	that, but I'll also be speaking to that in my
14	President's report.
15	Ridership is up. And we've hit some
16	milestones over the past month that we're very
17	excited about that continue to show the growth of
18	ridership that we anticipate will continue
19	throughout the rest of the year.
20	But we're over a million rides a day for a
21	number of days this past month. And I think we
22	and I know that we had one of the best weeks in
23	ridership that we have had since the pandemic hit
24	over the course of the past couple weeks, so

1	things are still moving in a very positive trend.
2	And I'll give you some more information about that
3	in my President's report.
4	MR. FINE: There's actually, speaking
5	at a conference this morning with a bunch of bond
6	investors and they too echo the positive
7	sentiments which is that March changed in what
8	we've seen previously of, you know, where is the
9	new normal. And I think that they had indicated
10	in the poll that they still think that the new
11	normal will not settle for another year or two or
12	longer, potentially. So, again, I think that
13	we've seen sustained growth in ridership and
14	there's more to come.
15	DIRECTOR JAKES: How are we looking
16	compared to other transit agencies?
17	PRESIDENT CARTER: We're about where other
18	transit agencies are. We're in the mid 60
19	percentile for our ridership from pre-2019 levels.
20	Most other transit agencies are in that same area.
21	I think the one outlier might be New York,
22	but New York is a totally different beast because
23	of the reliance on public transportation to just
24	about go anywhere. Their ridership is growing

1	maybe a little bit faster, but they are still
2	below prepandemic levels. No one is at a no
3	major transit system is at a prepandemic level at
4	this point.
5	DIRECTOR JAKES: All right. That's it for
6	me. Thank you.
7	MS. GREENLEE: Okay. Director Jha, any
8	questions?
9	DIRECTOR JHA: No. Thank you so much.
10	MS. GREENLEE: Director Ortiz.
11	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: No. Thank you.

21	DIRECTOR JAKES: Our next order of
22	business is an ordinance amending Ordinance
23	No. 018-35 as amended authorizing and modifying a
24	short-term borrowing program for capital purposes

1 secured by sales tax receipts authorizing the 2 issuance from time to time of obligations secured by such revenues in an aggregate principal amount 3 4 outstanding at any one time not in excess of 600 5 million pursuant to such short-term borrowing 6 program and authorizing the execution and delivery 7 of one or more supplemental indentures. Say that 8 three times, what I just read. Jeremy Fine. 10 MR. FINE: Yes. Good morning. I'm Jeremy 11 Fine, your chief financial officer. And today I present for your consideration an ordinance 12 13 authorizing the expansion of the capital line of credit program from 300 million to 600 million. 14 15 The expanded line of credit program will 16 allow us to do interim funding for critical 17 projects, including the Red/Purple modernization and the Red Line Extension as well as other 18 projects in the capital improvement program. 19 The 20 line of credit will be repaid once Federal or State reimbursements are received or when 2.1 22 long-term bonds are issued based on the funding 2.3 source of the project. 2.4 CTA currently has two lines of credit

1	outstanding, one with JP Morgan and one with Wells
2	Fargo, each for up to 150 million. We will
3	solicit bids from banks for the additional 300
4	million and the short-term borrowing program will
5	be secured by a pledge of sales tax revenue
6	receipts on par with the existing second lien
7	sales tax revenue bonds, which is our current
8	working lien.
9	This concludes my remarks and I'm glad to
10	answer any questions.

23	because, otherwise, what we have to do is we have
24	to borrow via a bond deal at higher interest

1	rates, have that money sit not being used until
2	those actual draws or those payments to the
3	vendors actually occur.
4	So this program has saved us millions of
5	dollars since we implemented this a few years ago.
6	So it's a very smart way to do the interim funding
7	so that we're not sitting on long-term bond
8	proceeds at very and paying high interest costs
9	when we don't necessarily need all of the funds at
10	one time. We just draw this down as needed and
11	then repay it from the funding sources I mentioned
12	or via a bond deal that we would do down the road.

21	lease at the Kimball rail station. Bill Mooney.
22	MR. MOONEY: Good morning. Bill Mooney,
23	your chief infrastructure officer.
24	Real estate staff recommends approval of

1	an ordinance to consent to the assignment of a
2	lease at the Kimball rail station on the Brown
3	Line. CTA leases the retail concession space
4	located at Kimball Station at 4755 North Kimball
5	to First Equity Group Concessions, LLC, an
6	Illinois corporation.
7	First Equity has requested the CTA's
8	consent to assign the Kimball lease to Shree
9	Kimball, Inc., the assignee is the current
10	operator of the business at this location as
11	sublessee of First Equity.
12	This assignment will allow CTA to contract
13	directly with the operator of the concession. The
14	assignment also contains a payment plan for the
15	assignee to pay the amounts owed on the lease by
16	First Equity. The assignment otherwise will not
17	affect the terms of the lease, and the assignor
18	will remain liable if the assignee should default.
19	I'll be happy to take any questions on

9	DIRECTOR JAKES: Review of an ordinance
10	authorizing an intergovernmental agreement with
11	the Forest Preserves of Cook County to convey
12	property and take mitigation measures due to
13	impacts from the Red Line Extension Project.
14	Bill.
15	MR. MOONEY: Thank you. Furtherance of
16	the proposed Red Line Extension Project and
17	consistent with the August 2022 final
18	environmental impact statement record of decision,
19	staff recommends that CTA enter into an IGA with
20	the Forest Preserve of Cook County to prepare and
21	convey two parcels acquired from the City of
22	Chicago to the Forest Preserve and provide
23	mitigation measures benefitting the Beaubien Woods
24	Forest Preserve.

1	Pursuant to CTA's commitment, CTA would
2	pay the Forest Preserve an amount not to exceed
3	\$587,000 to provide for mitigation of impacts to
4	Beaubien Woods, including environmental site
5	assessments of the conveyed parcels as well as
6	support for the construction of a new trail
7	connection from Altgeld Gardens to Beaubien Woods.
8	Separately, CTA will provide signage and
9	way findings within of the new 130th Street
10	Station and on the exterior grounds regarding the
11	Beaubien Forest Preserve.
12	Finally, CTA will provide the Forest
13	Preserve with up to \$150,000 in unsold advertising
14	space on Red Line trains and bus routes that use
15	the 130th Street Garage to encourage CTA riders to
16	use public transportation to visit the Forest
17	Preserve.
18	I'll be happy to take any questions on
19	this item.
20	DIRECTOR JAKES: Bill, what is what
21	so what's the handshake between CTA and Cook
22	County? If we're giving doing all of the
23	we're paying you this and we're doing X, Y, and Z,
24	what are they doing other than receiving a check?

1	MR. MOONEY: So the new 130th Station
2	that's planned for the Red Line Extension Project
3	terminal in Altgeld Gardens is going on property.
4	And, ultimately, when the new rail line comes
5	through it, it causes an impact to the Forest
6	Preserves.
7	So under the environmental assessment when
8	we studied the project, we had to identify
9	potential impacts of the surrounding area and
10	create mitigations for those impacted parties.
11	Specifically, in this case, the Section
12	4(f) of the federal registration for this, which
13	is on park spaces, so we actually are compensating
14	the Forest Preserve for the impact that we'd be
15	making to their property by putting the extension
16	through there.
17	Ultimately, we cut off access to a certain
18	portion of their property by the train tracks that
19	come across old 130th Street. And, ultimately, we
20	are compensating them for the impact of the
21	access.
22	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. Thank you.
23	MS. GREENLEE: Director Lee, do you have
24	any questions?

1	DIRECTOR LEE: No questions.
2	MS. GREENLEE: Director Miller.
3	DIRECTOR MILLER: No questions.

11	PRESIDENT CARTER: Director, before you
12	move on to the next item, I just wanted to add a
13	little bit more to what Mr. Mooney said about the
14	exchange that we're doing here.
15	Under the Federal Law the question may
16	came up, why don't you just pay the money for the
17	property that we're impacting. Under the Federal
18	Law, the intent of that law is to replace the park
19	land that is lost. And so what agencies have to
20	do when they engage in a and what, in effect,
21	is a taking of park property is that you have to
22	identify other places where you can restore the
23	property to make the community whole.
24	And so in this particular case, what we

1	end up doing is finding other parcels of land that
2	can be utilized for the purpose for which the
3	original parcel was impacted to basically make
4	them whole, for lack of a better word.
5	So the idea is to not just give them money
6	because money doesn't get you, you know, a
7	playground or whatever it is that you may have
8	lost. The idea is to find another place to create
9	a similar some opportunity for the purpose of
10	which that property was being used. And that's
11	what we would engage in to basically address this
12	issue under this agreement.
13	DIRECTOR JAKES: So would it be on CTA to
14	find the property?
15	PRESIDENT CARTER: Yes.
16	DIRECTOR JAKES: And has the property been
17	found?
18	MR. MOONEY: Yes.
19	PRESIDENT CARTER: Yes.
20	MR. MOONEY: The Board approved an
21	intergovernmental agreement with the City of
22	Chicago last month that included the two parcels
23	that are in question in this. So we are acquiring
24	from the City of Chicago parcels that we then are

1	conveying to the Forest Preserve.
2	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay.
3	PRESIDENT CARTER: That's it. I just
4	wanted to clarify that one point for you.
5	DIRECTOR JAKES: I appreciate that.
6	So agenda 7, review of an ordinance
7	authorizing an intergovernmental agreement with
8	the Chicago Park District for the acquisition of a
9	park parcel for the Red Line Extension Project in
10	exchange for improvements to and conveyance of
11	replacement parcels.
12	Bill.
13	MR. MOONEY: I'm sorry. Which agenda
14	item?
15	DIRECTOR JAKES: 7.
16	MR. MOONEY: My order trails off on my
17	notes here. Okay. Cool. Thank you.
18	Staff recommends approval of an ordinance
19	there it is.
20	Staff recommends approval of an ordinance
21	authorizing an intergovernmental agreement with
22	the Chicago Park District for the acquisition of a
23	portion of Fernwood Parkway in support of the Red
24	Line Extension Project.

1	CTA has identified parcels of property
2	necessary for the project and the Board designated
3	the parcels for acquisition. The Park District
4	owns an existing passive park, Fernwood Parkway,
5	located between 99th and 103 streets and has
6	agreed to transfer the parcel to the CTA in
7	exchange for multiple parcels of equivalent
8	acreage on the Park District's parcel.
9	The Park District will choose from a list
10	of multiple parcels to create replacement parks
11	and CTA will make the improvements to the
12	replacement parks including the environmental
13	assessments and remediations before conveying them
14	to the Park District.
15	Similar to what President Carter mentioned
16	earlier, in this circumstance, we are acquiring
17	passive park space from the Park District itself
18	and we have identified a series of parcels that we
19	will make available to them to compensate them in
20	acreage.
21	DIRECTOR JAKES: I have no questions.
22	MS. GREENLEE: Director Lee.
23	DIRECTOR LEE: No questions.

12	of a parcel and acceptance of permanent and
13	temporary easements for the Red Line Extension
14	Project.
15	Bill.
16	MR. MOONEY: Staff recommends approval of
17	an ordinance authorizing an intergovernmental
18	agreement with the Chicago Housing Authority for
19	property located within the Altgeld Gardens and
20	Phillip Murray Homes complex.
21	CTA has identified parcels of property
22	necessary for the project and the Board designated
23	the parcels for acquisition. The CHA owns the
24	identified parcels located near South Greenwood

1	Avenue between 130th and 132nd Streets in Chicago.
2	CTA will pay the CHA \$950,000 for the fee
3	property, \$53,200 for the permanent easement, and
4	\$145,000 for the temporary easement and is
5	required to pay closing costs. The IGA also
6	requires CTA to perform environmental site
7	assessments that CHA reasonably requests, and CTA
8	would bear the cost of such work, if necessary.
9	I'd be happy to take any questions on this
10	item.
11	DIRECTOR JAKES: No questions.
12	MS. GREENLEE: Director Lee.
13	DIRECTOR LEE: Bill, can you give us some
14	context around, you know, why this is happening?
15	MR. MOONEY: So the planned extension has
16	a terminal at 130th Street. The land identified
17	for the placement of the terminal is currently
18	land owned by the CHA, so we are acquiring the
19	land for the terminal itself.
20	DIRECTOR LEE: Thank you.

6	DIRECTOR JAKES: Review of an ordinance
7	authorizing payment of up to 6 million for
8	stipends to encourage proposals for the Red Line
9	Extension Project design.
10	Bill.
11	MR. MOONEY: This is the last one from me
12	today.
13	Staff recommends approval of an ordinance
14	authorizing the payment of up to \$6 million for
15	stipends to encourage proposals for the Red Line
16	Extension Project design contract.
17	CTA is undertaking a two-step procurement
18	process in which interested contractors first
19	submit their qualifications and those deemed most
20	qualified were invited to submit proposals.
21	On September 8th, 2023, CTA staff issued a
22	request for proposals to the three selected
23	proposers. Industry, custom, and best practice
24	for design build mega projects calls for a payment

1	of stipends to unsuccessful proposers who are
2	prequalified and submit compliant proposals.
3	CTA staff recommends the stipend for this
4	contract for each unsuccessful proposer be set at
5	\$3 million. In order to be eligible to receive
6	the stipend, the short-list proposers will be
7	required to sign a stipend agreement as part of
8	the RFP process. The stipend is only payable
9	after proposals are submitted, reviewed by CTA,
10	and a design build contract is awarded.
11	I'll be happy to take any questions.
12	DIRECTOR JAKES: Bill, I'm not
13	understanding what you're saying.
14	So 3 million you submit a proposal. If
15	the proposal is not accepted, we give you a
16	stipend?
17	MR. MOONEY: Yes, sir. So the way this
18	works is to put together a proposal for a bid of
19	this magnitude for a contractor, they go out a
20	significant amount of investment in the upwards of
21	\$12 to \$30 million on a project of this scale.
22	So to support innovation on the proposals
23	and to support aggressive bids, they have to to
24	really get that type of honing in on their

1	proposals, they have to make that level of
2	investment. We want to encourage that.
3	So the winning bidder wins the project,
4	right? And they win the opportunity to earn that
5	work and earn that fee in the long run. The
6	losing bids do not. And the best way to have
7	competition is to make sure that people at the
8	table are interested in pursuing the work. And so
9	we are stipending a little bit of the offset of
10	the cost to encourage that engineering work that
11	they have to put in to sharpen their pencils.
12	As part of that, anything that they
13	propose in concepts as part of their project, we
14	own the rights to. So down the line, any
15	innovating vision a contractor may propose, we own
16	the rights to that as part of the stipend
17	agreement, so we can actually negotiate that as
18	part of the winning agreement as well.
19	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. Got it. Makes
20	sense.
21	MS. GREENLEE: Director Jha, any
22	questions?
23	DIRECTOR JHA: No questions. Thanks.
24	MS. GREENLEE: Director Ortiz.

1	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Thank you for that
2	background.
3	MS. GREENLEE: Chairman Barclay.
4	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: No questions.

12	other mega projects in the industry. It is within
13	the range of most of those other industries. It's
14	a little higher than some, a little less than
15	others.
16	The market has been very challenging right
17	now. Getting getting design build contracts
18	and competition on designed build contracts in an
19	industry that's very lush with work right now is
20	keeping people interested in the table that they
21	want this piece of work, they want to chase this
22	piece of work is really important.
23	DIRECTOR LEE: Thank you.
24	MS. GREENLEE: Director Jakes, there are

1	no further questions.
2	DIRECTOR JAKES: May I now have leave to
3	place this item on the omnibus for Board approval?
4	DIRECTOR MILLER: So moved.

1	DIRECTOR JAKES: Review of an ordinance
2	authorizing the intergovernmental agreement with
3	the Regional Transportation Authority for access
4	to an aerial photography subscription.
5	Mike Connelly and Ilsa. Just you Mike.
6	MR. CONNELLY: Just me.
7	DIRECTOR JAKES: All right.
8	MR. CONNELLY: Good morning. Mike
9	Connelly, your chief planning officer.
10	This ordinance would authorize an IGA with
11	the Regional Transportation Authority to allow CTA
12	access to high resolution aerial imagery from a
13	vendor called Nearmap.
14	The Regional Transportation Authority has
15	a contract with Nearmap. And under that contract,
16	CTA will continue to receive access to Nearmap's
17	high resolution aerial imagery. RTA's
18	subscription is available not only to CTA but also
19	to Metra and Pace, our sister agencies.
20	This Nearmap resolution imagery is a
21	significantly higher resolution than most others
22	available and really has a strong value to us as
23	an agency as we do our future planning.
24	With Nearmap's aerial photography, CTA

1	staff and contractors associated with our
2	departments can monitor and analyze both
3	infrastructure and environmental changes over
4	time. The Nearmap imagery is updated several
5	times a year and dates back to 2014. This service
6	is free to CTA through this IGA with the RTA.
7	Thank you. And at this point, I'll be
8	glad to try to answer any questions that you have.
9	DIRECTOR JAKES: I have no questions,
10	Mike. Thank you.
11	MS. GREENLEE: Director Jha.
12	DIRECTOR JHA: No questions. Thanks.

22	DIRECTOR JAKES: Review of an ordinance
23	authorizing an intergovernmental agreement with
24	the City of Chicago through its Department of

1 Police for Federal FY2022 Transit Security Grant 2 Funds. Nancy-Ellen. 3 MS. ZUSMAN: Good morning. Nancy-Ellen 4 Zusman, chief safety and security officer for CTA. The Transit Security Grant program is part 5 6 of a comprehensive set of measures authorized by 7 Congress to help strengthen the nation's critical 8 infrastructure against risks associated with 9 potential terrorist attacks. 10 In Federal fiscal year 2022, the TSGP allocated \$93 million to the nation's key high 11 12 threat urban areas to enhance security measures for critical transit infrastructure including bus, 13 14 rail, and ferry systems. 15 CTA has received grant money under the 16 program every year since it was enacted in 2010. 17 CTA was awarded fiscal year 2022 TSGP funds in the amount of \$647,520. The grant awarded \$647,520 18 for CPD's transit terrorism search operations 19 20 sustainment project. Staff recommends that CTA enter into an 2.1 22 intergovernmental agreement with CPD to pass 23 through this money in fiscal year 2022 Department 2.4 of Homeland Security funds to CPD for

1	transit-related antiterrorism operations.
2	CPD is the primary transit security
3	provider for the CTA and is therefore eligible for
4	reimbursement of operational costs that apply to
5	counterterrorism. Do you have any questions?
6	DIRECTOR JAKES: Nancy, for the sake of
7	the public
8	MS. ZUSMAN: Sure.
9	DIRECTOR JAKES: I want to state how
10	We had a very great conversation, you, myself, and
11	Kevin, regarding this grant. And, you know, so
12	that the public will know that, one, that CTA does
13	not have its own security force.
14	MS. ZUSMAN: Correct.
15	DIRECTOR JAKES: That is the
16	responsibility of the Chicago Police Department.
17	MS. ZUSMAN: Correct.
18	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. And that this
19	grant is we're just we're the person that
20	gets the money and then pass it on.
21	MS. ZUSMAN: Correct.
22	DIRECTOR JAKES: Because CPD cannot apply
23	for the grant.
24	MS. ZUSMAN: Correct.

DIRECTOR JAKES: And I just really want 1 2 the public to understand that. 3 MS. ZUSMAN: I completely understand. 4 let me just -- you and I did have a very nice 5 conversation about this. 6 So the Federal Government has a program 7 that only transit agencies are eligible to apply 8 for and it's for security related to antiterrorism 9 activities. CTA does not have its own police 10 We use the Chicago Police Department to 11 provide enforcement and security on the system. 12 It is CPD that needs this money but they 13 are not eligible to apply for it. So CTA applies for the money on behalf of CPD and then through an 14 15 intergovernmental agreement, we pass that money to 16 CPD for them to use. And as we discussed, this is 17 fiscal year 2022 money, so it's basically in 18 arrears. So they've already done the work; this is for them to be reimbursed. 19 20 So CTA, because it doesn't have its own 2.1 police force -- a lot of transit agencies do, but 22 we do not -- otherwise, there would be no way for 23 the Chicago Police Department to get this Federal 2.4 assistance. So CTA applies for the money, passes

1	it through through these annual intergovernmental
2	agreements. Every year, we do the same thing.
3	We've been doing it for a long time. And that's
4	what this ordinance is for.
5	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. And I want to make
6	sure that, once again, everyone understands this
7	is for antiterrorism.
8	MS. ZUSMAN: Antiterrorism.
9	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: So when have the
10	Billiken Day parade and the Columbus Day parade
11	and a Beyonce concert and a Taylor Swift concert
12	and all of these major events, that this money is
13	for police officers to make sure that the public
14	feels safe.
15	MS. ZUSMAN: Correct. It's around what
16	they designate as surge events. So the marathon,
17	that would be classified as a surge event.
18	So it's only for antiterrorism activities.
19	It doesn't impact CTA's budget at all. It's a
20	straight passthrough of Federal funds that CTA
21	applies for on behalf of the Chicago Police
22	Department because they're not eligible.
23	So I would imagine, given everything
24	happening in the world right now, there will be

1	some surge activities, antiterrorist activities
2	that CPD will decide to deploy its officers for
3	and then next year we will be trying to get money
4	to get reimbursed for them related to that.
5	DIRECTOR JAKES: And I don't want to
6	belabor the point. But because of the alleged day
7	of rage that's been called for
8	MS. ZUSMAN: Today. Yes.
9	DIRECTOR JAKES: And I'm not speaking on
10	being pro-Israeli or pro-Palestinian. I'm talking
11	about the day of rage that is allegedly supposed
12	to happen. Would this money cover that CTA or
13	the Chicago Police Department, not CTA will the
14	Chicago Police Department, on behalf of CTA, on
15	today do something? Would that cover that?
16	MS. ZUSMAN: Potentially, they would
17	deploy additional resources to address that. They
18	would keep track, right? Timesheets and the like.
19	And then, next year, they would be seeking
20	reimbursement because it's in arrears. So we
21	would be here a year from now seeking that money.
22	DIRECTOR JAKES: So we have a net 365 with
23	them?
24	MS. ZUSMAN: Yes, yes, yes.

1	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. All right. Thank
2	you, Nancy. No further questions.
3	MS. GREENLEE: Are there any additional
4	questions?
5	Director Lee.
6	DIRECTOR LEE: Just one question. I guess
7	can you just talk about for the public's sake how
8	the CTA and the CPD kind of collaborates on these
9	different types of initiatives or is it more just
10	the CPD, you know, decides?
11	MS. ZUSMAN: So and I will invite up
12	is Kevin Ryan here my vice president of
13	security. Kevin is in daily contact with the
14	Chicago Police Department, so I think I'm going to
15	go ahead and let him answer specific questions
16	about that relationship.
17	MR. RYAN: Good morning. Can you repeat
18	the question, please?
19	DIRECTOR LEE: Just would you highlight
20	the collaborative efforts between CPD and CTA.
21	MR. RYAN: We as Nancy-Ellen cited, I
22	speak to Commander Bird and the command staff of
23	the police department on a daily basis.
24	Getting to your point, we had a conference

1	call with the FBI yesterday. So we discussed not
2	only terrorism, Homeland Security-related issues,
3	but Commander Bird and I go through incidents that
4	happen on the CTA, crime trends, what we're
5	seeing, and we I get his deployments. I make
6	my recommendations. And then we deploy our
7	private security based on his deployments. It's
8	all collaborative.
9	So we're talking together constantly and
10	our investigators are speaking to the public
11	transportation detectives daily as well as we
12	assist them with the SCSC room, which is the
13	monitoring room for the cameras and everything
14	like that. So that's kind of it in the nutshell.
15	DIRECTOR LEE: Yeah. No. Thank you.
16	Safety is the top priority. We just want to make
17	sure that everyone understands what's going on
18	because thank you. No questions.
19	MS. GREENLEE: Director Miller.
20	DIRECTOR MILLER: No questions.
21	MS. GREENLEE: Chairman Barclay.
22	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: No questions.
23	MS. GREENLEE: Director Ortiz.
24	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: No questions.

1	MS. GREENLEE: Director Jha.
2	DIRECTOR JHA: Just one question.
3	Is the funding request related to the
4	request for reimbursement or is there a max or a
5	cap on how much you can request?
6	MS. ZUSMAN: So it's a discretionary grant
7	program, which means we can ask for how much we
8	want; that doesn't necessarily mean we're going to
9	be awarded everything we ask for. It's up to the
10	Federal Government. And, in this case, it's the
11	Department of Homeland Security to decide how
12	much. Because it's not just us competing for the
13	funds. It's transit agencies across the country.
14	DIRECTOR JHA: And does that carry over,
15	the funding that you get?
16	MS. ZUSMAN: I'm not sure what you're
17	asking in terms of carry over.
18	DIRECTOR JHA: Do you always request what
19	the CPD is asking for reimbursement or do you go
20	above and beyond that? In that case, the excess
21	amount, does that carry over?
22	MS. ZUSMAN: So this particular grant
23	program, we also applied for some funding for
24	ourselves, and that went to cybersecurity. So we

1	make a decision of how much of the money that we
2	received is earmarked based on their response to
3	our request for reimbursement, how much is going
4	to go to CPD, and how much is going to go for
5	other antiterrorist-type activities that CTA would
6	do, like I said, cybersecurity.
7	DIRECTOR JHA: So it's not a sole
8	passthrough program, right?
9	MS. ZUSMAN: Right. But this
10	intergovernmental agreement is for the passthrough
11	because CPD can't apply on its own behalf.
12	DIRECTOR JHA: And are there guidelines
13	for CPD in terms of how their mandates of what
14	constitutes CTA-related expenses versus not?
15	MS. ZUSMAN: So the language of the
16	application is going to say what it can cover in
17	terms of activities. We could go into more
18	detail.
19	You know, as Kevin said, it's deployment
20	based on these surge dates and what they can do.
21	It has to be antiterrorist activities, so it can't
22	be what you would sort of consider more
23	traditional crime deterrents. It really needs to
24	relate back to antiterrorist activities.

1	DIRECTOR JHA: Thank you.
2	DIRECTOR JAKES: So, Nancy, I'm sorry, I
3	have to go back now. My question now is almost
4	for Jeremy. You apply for the grant. And if it's
5	backdated let's say 2022, you applied for the
6	grant and the government says, well, we're only
7	giving you 30 percent of your ask, then where does
8	the other 70 percent come from? Because if it's
9	reimbursed if it's supposed to be reimbursed,
10	then who picks up the reimbursement?
11	PRESIDENT CARTER: Keep in mind that the
12	police department has already paid these expenses.
13	DIRECTOR JAKES: Right.
14	PRESIDENT CARTER: So it is a pure
15	reimbursement. If it isn't reimbursed by the
16	Federal Government, that means it's part of what
17	the police department would normally pay.
18	DIRECTOR JAKES: Okay. So they would just
19	have to eat
20	PRESIDENT CARTER: Yeah. The cost doesn't
21	come to CTA in any way. This is all CPD expense
22	for deploying these resources for which a
23	percentage of it will be reimbursed.
24	I think it's important to point out, this

1 program is oversubscribed. It's a discretionary 2 program that's nationally indicated. There are 3 always more expenses than there is money available 4 to pay for it. 5 So no one goes into this process assuming 6 they're getting all their costs reimbursed. 7 never gotten all the costs reimbursed in the 8 history of the program itself. But every little 9 bit helps. And I'm sure if you were to talk to 10 the police superintendent, he would say that, you know, a few million dollars that they now don't 11 12 have to cover from their budget that has been paid 13 for by CTA. DIRECTOR JAKES: So bottom line is we 14 15 don't have to pay for it? 16 PRESIDENT CARTER: Correct. 17 DIRECTOR JAKES: There you go. All right. 18 MR. FINE: We have been very successful in 19 getting this. And as Nancy-Ellen said, you know, 20 this has become a very aggressive pool of people competing for this funding. So the fact that we 2.1 22 continue to receive, you know, the funding is a 23 good testament to the good work that safety and 24 security is doing, the grant proposal application

1 and whatnot, and getting in there and getting this 2 funding secured on a yearly basis. 3 MR. RYAN: We normally do very well. 4 We're right behind New York normally with the 5 funding. So New York gets the lion's share and we 6 usually come in second. 7 PRESIDENT CARTER: This program has a 8 somewhat interesting herring. When it first was 9 set up, the money was being spread pretty evenly 10 throughout the entire country. And so, you know, St. Cloud, Minnesota may get a certain amount of 11 12 money, as much as Chicago got. 13 Congress didn't like that approach and 14 actually said that we need to be spending the 15 majority of money in what we would view as high 16 target areas like New York, Chicago, LA, you know, 17 Washington, D.C., things like that. 18 And the program was sort of revamped to basically target more of the money going to those 19 20 areas and less money going to other areas around 2.1 the country. That has been in place for a number 22 of years and that sort of drives how much we end 23 up getting.

And as Kevin indicated, you know, we tend

1	to do very well. We're probably right behind New
2	York in terms of the amount of money that we get
3	reimbursed for.

6	2023 through October 31st, 2024.
7	Sisavanh.
8	MS. BAKER: That's correct. Thank you.
9	DIRECTOR JAKES: All right.
10	MS. BAKER: Thank you. Sisavanh Baker
11	from the law department. We are coming before the
12	Board for renewal of our cyber insurance policy.
13	This is an annual policy that is renewed every
14	year. And the term of this policy will begin
15	November 1st, 2023 and end October 31st, 2024.
16	Our insurance broker, Alliant and DBE
17	Paradigm, marketed this coverage to the insurance
18	market and approached 51 insurance companies for
19	competitive proposals.
20	We recommend proceeding with the most
21	competitively quoted insurer, AmTrust. This
22	carrier has offered to maintain our current sub
23	limits at a full \$2 million policy limit such as
24	cyber extortion, data recovery, and business

1	interruption.
2	Our deductible is still at 1 million and
3	our base premium will be approximately \$140,000
4	before taxes and fees, which reflects a 33 percent
5	increase.
6	This insurance policy continues to provide
7	a number of protections for the CTA related to
8	cyber breaches or intrusions on the CTA's
9	computers and networks as well as cyber extortion.
10	We recommend renewal of this policy with AmTrust.
11	And I am happy to answer any questions.
12	DIRECTOR JAKES: No questions. Thank you.
13	MS. GREENLEE: Director Lee.
14	DIRECTOR LEE: No questions.

1	DIRECTOR JAKES: Review of an ordinance
2	authorizing the purchase of blanket railroad
3	protective liability insurance for policy year
4	November 1st, 2023, through October 31st, 2024.
5	Sisavanh.
6	MS. BAKER: Thank you very much.
7	This is our annual policy that the CTA has
8	had in place for 14 years. It is a blanket policy
9	that covers all CTA contractors and certain
10	noncontractors who perform work within 50 feet of
11	the CTA railroad right of way.
12	The CTA enrolls these businesses in the
13	program and prorates the cost of the insurance
14	across the construction projects such that CTA is
15	not out of pocket for the costs of the insurance.
16	Our insurance broker, Mesirow, now Alliant
17	and DBE Paradigm, again marketed the renewal of
18	this annual policy to the insurance market and our
19	incumbent insurer, Aspen Specialty Insurance,
20	offered the best price for the renewal. The rates
21	remain the same as the expiring policy and it's
22	due generally to the favorable market.
23	Our initial base cash deposit is \$13,519
24	before taxes and fees and we are requesting a

1	not-to-exceed amount of \$500,000 for the projected
2	premium. We recommend this carrier.
3	And I'm happy to answer other questions or
4	concerns.
5	DIRECTOR JAKES: I have no questions.
